U.S. Contracts.

The Office of Naval Research, U.S. Navy, have advised that a second grant has been made, amounting to \$5,480, for the continuation of research in the micropulsations on the radio magnetic field. Cambridge Laboratories, U.S. Air Force, expect to send out three riometers on

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indefinite loan for the measurement of radio absorption in the upper atmosphere. The value of these is estimated to be about \$12,000. The one year contract with the U.S. National Bureau of Standards for the maintenance of their equipment at Waimate is being extended for a further six months at their request.

Mobil Computer.

The report of the Mobil Computer Laboratory for the month of April indicated an average daily use over 30 days of 11 hours 52 minutes. Major expansion of the electronic computer will take place at the beginning of 1964, when a 1623 extra storage unit will be installed to double the number storage of the machine. An order has been placed for the delivery of this unit.

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Universities Entrance Board Proposals.

Council has resolved that the Universities Entrance Board proposals regarding the Entrance Examinations be approved in principle and has made one or two comments, including a request that the examination should be as late as possible consistent with administrative convenience, and a suggestion that the Entrance Board be asked to investigate the use of Scholastic Aptitude Tests in the Universities Entrance Examination. Council has also sent forward to the Entrance Board a comment from the Professorial Board - "That the system of reassessment is too cumbersome and the Board would prefer Headmasters to make their assessments without seeing the examination results."
